Discourse as Data

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Background

- Sexual abuse is a significant social problem is Ireland and the UK.
- Research shows that there are significant differences between the reporting of sexual offences in the process and the reality of such offences on the ground.
- This paper examines some of those differences and looks at the role that of the media in the reporting of sexual abuse in Ireland and the UK.
- This study is funded by the Irish Research Council for the Humanities and Social Science.

Literature

- Hawkins, 1994: Prevention of abuse requires publics to be educated
- Brawley, 1995: Intervention strategies seen as particularly important.
- Franklin & Howartt, 1996; Goddard & Saunders, 2000: media coverage can be abusive in itself, a disservice to victims
- 'Name and shame' campaigns condemned

Current Methodology

- Irish Times/ UK Times/The Mirror databases on Nexis-Lexis
- Five weeks randomly sampled from each of ten years, yielding 50 weeks of stories in total
- Complex search term (all variants of sexual abuse/ assault, molestation, gross indecency, incest, rape and buggery) yielded the following:
 - 1127 stories from Irish Times
 - 868 stories from The Mirror
 - 961 stories from The Times (UK)
- Each story coded for 35 variables
- Irish Times complete, others are work in progress.

Conclusions

- Certain types of crime are over-reported, certain perpetrators are highlighted.
- Rape of both adults and children includes a blame component in reporting.
- Stranger danger is routinely emphasised.
- Familial abuse is diminished. In particular the extent of child sexual abuse is generally ignored.
- Child neglect is largely ignored.
- The narrow focus of coverage prevents the development of public outrage and works against the production of effective public policies.
